Term 2 Driving questions:

In what ways did resilience and perseverance support the successful leadership of King George VI?
How can art be an aid to better citizenship and support people's mental health?

Term 1 Achievements

Year 3 have had a fantastic term settling into KS2. Both classes have settled really well and they were fully engaged and enthusiastic when learning about towns and villages. They enjoyed learning their trips to Horley and Cross Hands Quarry which provided them with amazing experiences to help bring their learning to life. In literacy, pupils worked hard on our class story 'The Tunnel' and used this to create their own imaginative portal stories. Additionally, the children have explored the book 'Belonging' by Jeannie Baker and used this to develop their inference, prediction and explanation skills. This led to in depth discussions about a range of issues such as the passing of time, sustainability and the environment.

In addition to this, Year 3 have recapped and applied their number bond knowledge in maths to begin solving mental addition and subtraction problems and they are becoming increasingly confident with column addition and subtraction.

Literacy


In term 2, we will be exploring poetry using our five senses. The children will create their own poetry, thinking about what they can see, hear, taste, touch and smell. Linked to our Kings and Queens history topic, which will be focusing on the reign of King George VI, we will be discussing famous speeches in history to help us identify key writing tools in order to create our own effective speeches. Following this, we will be exploring the book 'Leon and the place between' where the children will be making personal judgements about the text and its interesting layout as well as the impact that this has on the reader.

At home: You could share poems with your child and try to get them to read it aloud with expression and discuss vocabulary choices with them. You could continue to read your child's accelerated reader book with them at home or complete quizzes about books that you have at home already if they are on the accelerated reader book list. Your child could also practise their cursive handwriting.

Maths

We will be continuing to consolidate our number calculation skills using mental and written methods to answer addition, subtraction, multiplication and division problems. We will then be moving on to problem solving techniques including missing number problems e.g. $11 \times \underline{\quad} = 44$. We will also be using bar models to help represent multiplication and division e.g.

Physical Education

In term 2 we will be completing some dance during indoor sessions and working on football skills outdoors. Towards the end of term we will hold a Year 3 inter-house family football competition for pupils to earn points for their house. We will also be developing ball skills including dribbling, passing and shooting with a focus on teamwork skills and basic tactics.

History

As mentioned, we will begin this term by looking at previous reigning monarchs in England. Year 3 will be focusing on King George VI, Queen Elizabeth's, the current monarch's, father. We will be discussing his relationship to the current Royal Family. In addition to this, we will also be exploring how King George VI overcame particular struggles relevant to his time on the throne and comparing this to how we overcome the struggles we face today.

Art

This term's creative focus is art. In year 3 we will be printing. Our printing will be based on the famous artists Georges Seurat, Paul Signac and Andy Warhol, taking inspiration from their unique styles, such as 'pointillism' and 'pop art'. We will explore printing with lots of different materials, including polystyrene, food and a variety of everyday items. We will be creating interesting patterns and we will be getting rather Christmassy too. The children will also create and advertise an appealing, sellable product.

We will be exploring how art can develop a community spirit and will be turning some of our artwork into effective Christmas cards which will be sent to local care homes.

Recycling

to keep our country tidy - 2 November 2018
