Fun and Excitement:

Our condition for learning for Term 2 is 'Fun and Excitement' which focuses heavily on developing our art skills across the school. This links nicely with our value of motivation. The curriculum is designed to build on the skills each year so the pupils have the chance to become confident artists. Each year group learns about the life and contributions of an artist to our society; most link to their units of learning. There is a range of mediums developed including: sculpture, textiles, sketching, digital print and printing. This term we are developing the use of the pupils sketchbooks to ensure they practise lots of skills before they do their final piece of art. We will also be making poppies for Remembrance and taking part in festive crafts.

Term 1: The World around us

This term all the pupils have taken part in lots of geography focused unit of learning. Some classes have been on geography field trips where they have explored the local area and visited a nearby village. In order to be confident geographers, the pupils need to be able to identify different human and physical features in the UK, Europe and North/South America; develop their map skills and take part in some fieldwork. As they go through the school, the pupils build on the knowledge that they have been taught in the previous year group so their skill base develops year on year. In the early year, we focus on the classroom environment and in Key stage 1 pupils look at their local environment. As they progress to year 3, pupils start to compare Banbury to the village of Horley. In year 4, they research different European countries and year 5 and 6 move on to studying both South and North America. Let's see what they have been doing....





EYFS

This term all of the children have spent time settling into their new classes and becoming familiar with their class routines. We have had a big focus on personal, social and emotional development as well as building relationships with peers and adults.

The **Cherry class** pupils have been busy with their transport topic, riding on wheeled equipment and creating tyre track artwork. **Plum class** pupils have enjoyed learning the Goldilocks and the Three Bears story and tasting porridge like the characters in the book. **Reception** pupils have been working hard in groups to build some new houses for the Three Little Pigs, ensuring they were strong enough to withstand being blown down by the Big Bad Wolf!



Year 1 have thoroughly enjoyed starting mastering number this term. They have been working on increasing their fluency to give a secure understanding of numbers and how they are made.

In geography, Year 1 have experienced a walk around our local area where they could recognise features of our town. They have then used their understanding of maps to create their own of the school and use them to direct their partner to a specific location.









Year 2 started off the term with their science topic of Minibeasts and the theme of Friendships. In forest school, all the children created a microhabitat fit for a ladybird. Alongside this, the children all wrote thoughtful apology letter in character from our book 'The bad - tempered ladybird'.

The children have also had chance to reflect on the role of Queen ELizabeth II in history, as well as her special friend Paddington, who inspired us to write various sets of instructions this term.







This term Year 3 have been considering how to make our towns and villages sustainable. They have researched all the different ways that we can become more sustainable and, with a visit to Horley, they have compared life in a village with that of Banbury.

In Literacy they have explored the book *The Tunnel* by Anthony Browne. They have been inspired to write portal stories and thought about how we all belong to different places.









This terms science in Year 4 has been exploring sound. The children have made musical instruments and then learnt about pitch and volume and how sound travels through the air.

In geography they have explored the countries of Europe. Using their teamwork skills, geographical, computing and literacy knowledge they have created a presentation to successfully show how they could, as tour guides, promote a trip to a European destination.

In addition they have learnt and performed the poem *Please Mrs Butler* by Allan Ahlberg.













Year 5 have been focused this term on answering the question: How can we save Lake Titicaca from the negative impacts of tourism to ensure a sustainable future?


The children have used map skills to learn all about South America and investigated its climate. They have researched the Uros people and the human and physical features of the area and developed an understanding of how tourism can be made sustainable. To showcase their knowledge they have all put together a newsround style presentation to show how to save Lake Titicaca using the green screen.



This term in geography Chestnut and Oak class have been working towards answering their driving question:

'The biomes of the Americas are diverse. In what ways does this impact its inhabitants?'.

They have worked hard learning about different climates and biomes around the world and also considered different times zones and how this all links together. Finally they discovered what 'tourism' meant and linked this all together in their final classroom project. Pupils were given a 'business' scenario', for example 'a new business wanted to set up a new surfing school' or 'a new farming company needs land for their animals and crops'. From this, they had to consider the best country or state or North or South America for their new business to set up. They had to consider the climate of the country, the biome, the current inhabitants and current tourist attraction and then they had to design a persuasive pitch to encourage a business to relocate to your country/state/city. Children really threw themselves into their tasks and this could be seen in the confidence they had whilst they then presented their final pitches. Well done to all pupils in Year 6 for showing resilience and bravery this term in their geography learning. It's been wonderful to see how focussed the pupils have been.

Trick or Treating

This week in assembly we talked about safety in our community. This included safety by the railway; stranger danger; the canal; the park and on the internet. We also talked about events that happen at this time of year especially Halloween. We shared the simple rules on the next page to ensure that everyone is safe at Halloween.



Trick or treating dos and don'ts:



- Young children should have proper adult supervision. Make sure everyone is wearing clothing appropriate for <u>pedestrian</u> <u>safety</u> in the dark and <u>crossing the road safely</u>.
- Approaching only the neighbours that you know will help to keep Halloween super safe. If not, knocking on houses decorated with a pumpkin in the window would be the next best thing.
- Make sure your 'tricks' are harmless.
- Remember your manners!
- Remember our school rules of respectful and safe.





Attendance matters!

There are positive benefits to be gained from regular attendance; this includes not only coming in every day, but also being in school on time.

Benefits include the following:

- Good habits instilling in our young children the idea that getting up and going to a setting is simply what you do a
 great life habit
- Children who attend every day develop a feel for the rhythm of the week and gain a sense of security and strong sense of belonging to their class and their school
- Secure relationships Young children find it easier to build and sustain a range of social relationships when they
 regularly attend their school setting
- Regular attendance helps to develop secure attachments with their peers and supportive adults
- Self-esteem Children who rarely miss sessions at an early years setting and come on time are more likely to feel good about themselves. This is because they know what goes on and what to expect, feel more confident with the adults and the other children and have more opportunities to be valued and praised for their own special contribution
- Children who regularly miss sessions or are generally late, can frequently experience a sense of having to try a little bit
 harder just to understand what is going on and what other children are talking about or doing. Regular attendance,
 on time, helps many young children to separate from their parents or carers at the start of the day and settle more
 readily into daily life of Dashwood
- Learning and Development our staff carefully plan every session for each child in their care and want to take every
 opportunity to help them thrive. Experiences gained in one session are often developed further in the next session,
 whether or not these are consecutive days. Being in school everyday ensures that they do not miss anything!





The Attendance Clock is coming to Dashwood!



Punctuality, and being on-time to school, is so important!

Regular school attendance brings enormous benefits to individual pupils, their families, schools and the community as a whole. Without regular attendance, levels of attainment suffer and opportunities are missed to obtain maximum benefit from education.

Persistent absence and lateness will affect a child's achievement and progress in school. Comprehensive research shows that there is a direct link between a child's level of school attendance and their level of school attainment.

As a parent it is your legal responsibility to ensure your child receives a suitable full time education. It is your responsibility that your child attends school each day and is on time.

It is important to set the expectation of good attendance right from the beginning of school so children grow up with 'good habits'.

In the first week back after half-term, the Attendance Clock will be visiting Dashwood each day! School starts at 8.45am, so make sure you are there on time to meet the clock and receive an attendance award sticker!

Parking



If you drive your child/children to school each day, please ensure that you park with care and respect the people living within our community, in particular Edward Street and Merton Street.

Please ensure that you do not block driveways. There are people living with disabilities in the community for whom it is essential that thor driveway is accessible 24 hours a day.

Additionally, parking on double yellow lines outside of our school on Merton Street, endangers our pupils lives. Schools entrances are designed to be left clear of vehicles to ensure that pupils can cross roads as safely as possible. Please follow the law by only parking in permitted places.

- Safeguarding: As always, safeguarding is of the utmost importance to us all at Dashwood. In order to keep all of our school community safe, I am asking that you do not use your mobile phone when you are onsite at anytime. Please leave them in your pocket or bag when you are onsite at all times.
