Year One Newsletter

Our Driving Question for Year 1 is: Why should people visit Banbury? Term 1 September to October 2023

Welcome to year 1! The children enjoyed a couple of days transition in their new classes and are excited to now be in their new classrooms. They are looking forward to exploring their new environment and start to complete different independent challenges throughout the day- please do chat to your child about what they have done each day in school.

The children will take part in PE each week. We currently don't have specific days for these but will let you know them as soon as possible. It would be great if PE kits could be brought into school for the first week of term.

PE kits stay in school all week, they need white t-shirt, black shorts/tracksuit trousers, trainers, black/dark coloured jumper or hoodie. We do go outside in the colder months so tracksuit trousers and a jumper are needed. Please make sure these are all labelled and in a labelled bag. Please remember pupils must not wear any jewellery for PE including stud earrings.

What makes a good friend?

We will be reading the story of 'Conker the Chameleon' and discussing the characteristics of what makes a good friend. We will also be looking at the zones of regulation and different feelings as well as setting classroom rules and expectations when learning in the school environment.



Literacy

Our story for the term is '**The Noisy Boat'** which is based on Julia Donaldson's 'A Squash and a Squeeze.' We will be learning this story to orally retell as a class and create story maps. This story is about a problem and resolution so when the pupils have a go at writing their own stories, they will include a simple problem and resolution on their own. Later in the term, we will be focusing on the story 'Funny Bones' as the children will be learning to write a recount of an event. Over the term, we will be reading all of Julia Donaldson books leading up to reading The Gruffalo which will be our story in Term 2.

At home: Remember to complete homework every week and return the homework book on a Wednesday. Every two weeks this will be phonics based. We will happily change books any day, but we are only able to change it once a week. Please keep this in your child's bookbag along with their reading record. Try to read with your child each night for 15 minutes; they could read to you and in turn you could share a book with them. Listening to stories is just as important as reading them themselves.

<u>Maths</u>

In maths this term we will have a focus on numbers to 10. We will check we can read and write our numbers, but also spot them in tens frames, dice patterns and on rekenreks without having to count all the objects. We will be comparing these numbers and ordering them. Children will also learn to count forwards and back from any number to 10. We will then move onto adding and subtracting within 10.

At home: You will receive maths homework every 2 weeks. At home, can you go on a number spotting journey? What numbers can you spot? Where did you spot the numbers? Look for numbers beyond 10. <u>PE</u>

The pupils will be learning about running this term as well as completing some gymnastics activities. They will learn to travel and balance effectively in a sequence.

Creative Curriculum

Our focus subjects will be: geography, PSHE and science. In geography, we will learn about our **school, town and country**. They will learn about features of the local environment and how to read simple **maps**. In PSHE, we will look at **belonging** and setting goals in a topic of their choice at the start of term. In science, we will be learning about naming trees and the seasons and weather.

The vocabulary we will be using in our topic will be: school, journey, route, travel, maps, atlas, globe, steet, postcode, avenue, country, town and environment.

Try using these words with your child at home to make sure they understand their meaning.
