

What's your favourite Girlguiding memory ever?



On the week beginning the 13th November 2023 some our Anti-Bullying Ambassadors recorded an assembly to share with the whole school to raise the profile of their anti-bullying campaigns. The ambassadors wanted to help all pupils in our school understand what bullying is, and what it isn't, and know ways in which they can get support should they ever need it.

Their assembly also focused on 'mean moments' and how these are not 'bullying' but where the pupils involved still need to be supported to help them stop. Here is what they shared:

RUDE vs MEAN vs BULLYING Because Everything Isn't Bullying

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'Mean Moments' V's Bullying

Sometimes we can say something 'mean' in the heat of the moment - we can call these 'mean moments'.

These are one-off's and we hopefully learn from them so they do not happen again or too often.

'Mean moments' are <u>NOT</u> 'bullying'. The most important thing is that we learn from mean moments so they are rare.

DON'T FORGET THE 3 R'S AT CHRISTMAS: <u>REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE!</u>

Mean of us will be celebrating Christmas and this often leads to the creation of a mountain of waste. Remember – be kind to our planet and REUSE< REDUCE< RECYCLE!

Here are some re-use and recycle tips for the festive season:

- > Give eco-friendly gifts like reusable cups or a gift to a wildlife membership.
- Go for a walk during the Christmas season instead of a drive enjoy our beautiful countryside.
- > Avoid single-use plastic like straws, decorations and cutlery
- Consider the wrapping paper you use, be inventive with your recycling. Decorated brown paper, fabric or tote bags look great as present wrapping.



- Send recycled Christmas cards and then save any you receive to re-use as present tags, bookmarks or bunting. Recycle the remainder of the card in the blue bins. (Remove glitter/ribbons e.t.c)
- Keep your plastic sweetie tubs and take them along to the Tub2PUB recycle spots in aid of Macmillan Cancer Support. <u>http://www.tub2pub.co.uk/tub2pub/</u>

- Use up uneaten food for stir fry/sandwiches or freeze if possible. Then use those silver recycling food bins for the leftovers.
- Leave the lids on your recycling bottles so these can also be included.
- Put your Christmas tree out for recycling on collection day (better still, have a potted tree that you can plant afterwards).
- Make your own crackers using kitchen roll tubes and home-made gifts.

Top Tip:

Keep your wrapping paper to reuse next year if it cannot be recycled.

[If it won't stay scrunched in a ball, it cannot be recycled]

Getting in the festive spirit!



Even though I am still learning I have already caughts lots of fish (the most I have caught in one day is 337) of different species.




Nursery - Plum Class



In PE, pupils in Redwood and Maple also learnt some Bollywood dancing!








Year 3 have really enjoyed finding out about King George VI this term. They have wowed us with the existing knowledge they acquired through their homework which they then added to in class. We have found out about what made him such a successful and popular king at the time, including how he led Britain through the war years as well as how he overcame his debilitating stutter to address the nation. The children looked at leadership qualities, their definitions and found out how they linked to King George VI. Once complete, the children considered the leadership qualities they have and how they're shown in school. A thoroughly engaging unit of learning about an inspiring role model from the past.

Cataleya, Year 3, is really enjoying leaning her times tables at the moment. We are reading *Leon and the place between* at the moment which is a great book to learn from!

Laura told the DBA News: 'I am really enjoying literacy and I am getting really good at my times tables too!'

Year 3 have also been working so hard this term in their Literacy lessons. They became ambassadors of change for Dashwood school and have worked hard to persuade Mrs Gordon-Weeks to revamp the lunchtime activity rota, making it fun and exciting as well as developing skills and friendships even further. The children took their original ideas and developed them into clear, concise paragraphs and used formal, persuasive language to write their effective speeches. After a discussion about presentation skills, the children practiced their speeches and a few children presented to Mrs Gordon-Weeks. They were a little nervous (which is normal) but did a brilliant job. We were delighted to receive an email this week congratulating the children on their fantastic vocabulary and presentations. The children are now very much looking forward to all the exciting opportunities for lunchtimes which will cater to many skills and interests. Well done Year 3!



and Creativity

Year 4 have been learning all about King John and analyzing whether he was a good or bad King and why. We have also looked at the Magna Carta which was introduced in medieval times. From this, we created our own Magna Carta's and wrote them on scrolls for display!

In Literacy, we have immersed ourselves in Haiku poetry. We have been writing poems with a range of themes including Remembrance.

Also this term we are continuing with our addition and subtraction unit, focusing on using column methods with more than one exchange.

Year 4 have been showing their creative flare over the past few weeks. In their art sessions, the pupils have focused on sculpture through researching and comparing the work of Barbara Hepworth and Alberto Giacometti. They then created their own sculptures through exploring the themes in their work. Year 4 were very excited to use different mediums including soap, foil and clay, to create unique sculptures based upon emotions. They are looking forward to exploring their computing skills to create an IMovie to present their outcomes!



Tomasz: 'I have enjoyed Maths - prime, square and cube numbers!'

Mia: 'I have enjoyed our reading lessons this term and answering questions based on the text that we have been learning!'



Year 6 have particularly enjoyed the history unit where we have been learning all about Tudor monarchs, Sir Francis Drake and the Spanish Armada. As part of this unit we have written a formal letter in response to Elizabeth I detailing the voyage of Sir Francis Drake's circumnavigation of the world.

In maths, Year 6 have been working hard on fractions including simplifying, comparing and adding and subtracting. For fractions, it is important to know all of our times tables and division facts so please continue practicing these at home.

Amber and Lacey told the DBA News that they had been learning all about Sir Francis Drake and Queen Elizabeth I. Our Poetry unit was fun too! In PE, handball and gymnastics have been great and in Art, we have been learning all about the artist Leonardo da Vinci and his famous artworks. We have been inspired to learn how to draw portraits!

Year 6 have also had an amazing time learning all about light and experimenting with shadows in science. They planned and carried out our own experiments to test how shadows change depending on an object's distance from a light source. They then plotted their results on to line graphs and drew conclusions from our findings. In history, they have been comparing the reigns of Elizabeth I and Mary I. They have considered what they each achieved in their reigns and have written their own discussion texts to decide on who they felt was the more successful Tudor monarch. Oak and Chestnut pupils are now moving on to our art unit to finish out the term and have begun learning all about the life of Leonardo da Vinci and his famous works.

- Hanna: 'I loved it when we had to go to lots of different shop from the Victorian Era to find things that a Victorian person would have actually used.'






ROCK UK 2023- The Year 6 Residential

It just goes to show how much you can achieve if you practice swimming regularly from a young age!




Our very own Mrs Galloway has been raising money for charity!

Dashwood's Recipe Corner

Makes 24, takes 45 minutes + 15 minutes baking

Ingredients:

375g (3 cups) plain flour

260g (1 1/6 cups) unsalted butter, softened

125g (1 cup + 2 tbsp) caster sugar, plus extra for sprinkling

1 large egg, plus 1 beaten egg for glazing

800g jar mincemeat



What You Need to Do: Make sure you have an adult to help you!

Weigh the flour (375g) out and put it in a large mixing bowl.

Measure the butter (260g) and cut into small pieces before adding to your bowl.

Measure the sugar (125g) and add to the bowl. Crack the egg into the bowl.

Mix everything until it's coming together then tip out onto a lightly floured surface. Fold until the pastry comes together – try not to over mix, as soon as it happily forms a ball you're done. Wrap the pastry up in cling film and pop it in the fridge for 15+ minutes or so.

Make sure an adult is close by here! Pre-heat your oven to 220C / 200C fan / 425F and grease a muffin tray (we just a spray of oil).

MAKE YOUR MINCE PIES

Lightly flour your work surface then roll the pastry out to 3mm thick.



When you're rolling it out, be sure to turn it 90 degrees between turns - it helps to stop it sticking to your work surface, and also ensures you get an even thickness. If you need to add a little extra flour underneath when you turn it. When it gets a bit bigger, roll it round your rolling pin before rotating it to stop it tearing.

Easy Mince Pies for kids

Easy Mince Pies for kids...continued

Use a round cutter (about 10cm) to cut out 24 bases and place them gently into muffin trays. To get the pastry right down into the base of each tin hole, use a little bit of rolled up pastry. This will push it down, without poking a hole in it.

Out a tablespoon or so of mincemeat into each base.

Re-roll the pastry and either use another round cutter to cut some lids (7cm) or if you have stars, use them.

Crack an egg into a small dish. If you are using a full lid brush the edges of your mince pies with a little egg before placing the lids on and pressing them down to seal. You don't need to worry about the egg at this point if you are using stars.

Use the egg to glaze the tops of the mince pies. If you are using a full lid, cut little slits in the middle.

Bake them for 15-20 minutes.

They're ready when they are golden brown and bubbling. When cooled, ENJOY!







Samuel's Sumptuous Banana and chocolate chip cookies

Samuel, Year 5, kindly shared this delicious recipe with us...definitely one to try at home!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 very ripe banana
- 150g whole rolled oats
- 6 medjool dates, pitted and roughly chopped
- 50ml olive oil
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 courgette grated
- 60g chocolate chips (optional, for topping)

INSTRUCTIONS

1.Preheat the oven to 180 degrees Celsius (make sure an adult helps you with this bit).

2. Grease two baking trays with olive oil.

3.Place the banana and dates in a food processor along with the olive oil, half of the oats and vanilla. Blitz for approximately one minute until you have a paste.

4. Squeeze the grated courgette in a clean cloth to remove the excess moisture before placing in a mixing bowl along with the chocolate chips, remaining oats and the contents of the food processor mixture.

5.Stir well to combine to a thick mix.

6.Spoon the mixture on to the baking trays using a dessert spoon to make approximately 18 cookies and gently smooth into flat rounds.


7.Place in the oven and bake for 25-30 minutes until golden brown on the outside. Transfer to a wire rack and leave to cool completely.



Festive Crafts


