YEAR 3 NEWSLETTER –

Driving Question: How can we preserve our waterways to ensure they have a sustainable future?

Achievements for this term

The children fully immersed themselves in our Ancient Egyptian topic where they delved into the historical time period and researched different aspects including mummification and the River Nile. The children developed their teamwork skills when creating their own Egyptian medicine and packaging. They loved it and made us proud. In addition to this, the children have learnt how to set up a successful fair test during our plant unit and they have answered scientific questions based on their findings.

Literacy

We will be practising our persuasive writing skills by promoting water safety to younger year groups. We are very excited to focus some of our literacy sessions on poetry including 'The Sound Collector' poem by Roger McGough, focusing on verbs. Further to this, we will be enhancing our story writing skills through writing a warning story using 'The Barn' as a model.

At home you could: Practise your weekly spellings, encourage children to read regularly and complete the Accelerated Reader quizzes based on the books they have read. The link and QR code will be sent home separately and we will show the children how to complete these tests in school.

Maths

This term we will continue learning about measurement and we will then move on to fractions. To support your child at home, you could ensure that they continue to practise their times tables regularly (TTRS). By the end of Year 3 they are expected to know their 2, 5, 10, 3, 4 and 8 times tables. You could help your childalso practise rapidly recalling addition and subtraction number facts to 20 (Numbots). Additionally, help your child to find equivalent fractions and fractions of amounts e.g. 3/4 of 20.

Science

This term, we will be learning about light. We will start by discussing why we need light, what darkness is explaining that light is reflected from surfaces. We will then be applying this knowledge to investigate how reflections and shadows are formed and can be changed. In addition, we will look at the dangers of direct sunlight and how we can keep ourselves protected.
