



PLASTIC

Most people think it doesn't really matter so they look over it but because people do that, the plastic waste crisis is just getting worse.

The Big Plastic count in 2022 involved nearly 250,000 people from schools, households and communities across the country and was the biggest investigation ever into UK household plastic waste. The results were astounding - almost 100 billion pieces of plastic are thrown away in the UK each year, with barely hardly any being recycled.

Back in 2017, Everyday Plastic founder, Daniel Webb,



collected every piece of his plastic waste for a year. With a scientific researcher, he developed a unique method to calculate his personal plastic footprint. Greenpeace and Everyday Plastic

teamed up to start The Big Plastic Count which offers every one of us the same chance to discover how much plastic we use – even if you are really careful this can amount to a lot!

The idea of having so many people involved is to show the scale of the problem and push to ensure that action is taken as a matter of urgency.

If you want to help out with The Big Plastic Count next time, simply sign up on their website and you will receive either a welcome pack in the post or a digital copy that you can print out yourself. You can also tally up your plastic online if you want to do that instead.

Only this week, Innayah has also been raising money for new books for our library! All at Dashwood are very grateful - thank you Innayah!







Their class story is Handa's Surprise and the children had a lot of fun exploring the fruit from the story using different senses. Many pupils showed their adventurous side by tasting some types of fruit for the first time. Music lessons have involved exploring rhythms and beats using instruments and experiencing different traditional compositions from various regions across Africa.




Year 1 have really enjoyed learning all about old toys and comparing them to new toys - they even brought their favourite toys in to school to share with their peers! They then used a chromebook to write all about their experiences. They have been amazed with how much toys have changed since the past.

Their class book - 'Dogger' by Shirley Hughes has been a real hit and they have even written their own versions of the story by sequencing the events and retelling it. This has led wonderful pieces of writing!

Agamjot told the DBA News that he is really enjoying the class story of Dogger and he also loves PE because they are learning to dribble balls and throw bean bags.

Wow, what a wonderful term Year 2 have had! In Literacy, they have been writing letters to Mrs Gordon-Weeks to tell her why pupils should not bring alligators to school. Based on their book

In Science, Year 3 pupils have been learning all about animals and grouping them by their characteristics.

Year 2 have also been really busy rehearsing for their play coming up in a few weeks! Their new class text 'If you ever want to bring an alligator to school don't' has led to some fantastic letter writing about why alligators shouldn't be in school.



We are also learning more about climate change and children are very interested in how they can help.

Assil told us that in Maths, Year 2 are learning about fractions and 'find the whole'. Assil told us 'It is a little challenging but I am enjoying it. In Literacy, we are learning about adverts and writing description texts.'









Year 3 - Stone Age WOW Day

Year 3 took part in an enjoyable 'Stone Age Day' at the end of Term 3 where they spent the whole day outside finding out about what life was like in this prehistoric time. Year 3 pupils mixed mud for cave paintings, toasted food over a fire, found out about how Stone Age people cooked and kept warm, made tools with stones and sticks, practiced their spear throwing skills and even created their own cave art with the mud paints they made!

This term, Year 3 were being scientific and investigating plants. After creating a group collage to show the key parts of the plant, the children wrote paragraphs about the key function each part of the plant performs. For example the stem holds the plant upright and transports water around the plant whereas the petals attract insects so that plants can reproduce. Pupils in Year 3 set up an investigation to find out what plants need for healthy growth. Ash Class found out if the amount of water affects growth. Silver Birch found out about the impact light has. Both classes have had to carefully consider the variables of their test (what will they change and what will we keep the same?).













This term, we have been developing our descriptive writing skills. To do this, we have designed our own creatures and used a range of different sentence structures and conjunctions to describe their features, habitats and eating habits. This has linked to our environmental topic in Science where we have explored the impact humans have on our world.

Here is what the Year 4 pupils have had to say about their learning this term:

Arlo: I have enjoyed doing science because it was very educational.

Vaughn: Science was really fun!

Ayda: This term, we have been making podcasts about deforestation, pollution

and litter.

Thorsten: In Literacy, we have been writing poems about the creatures that we made.

Dora: I have enjoyed creating animals in our science projects!

Rowan Class have had the exciting opportunity to learn how to play clarinets.

So far, they have learnt how to build the instrument and play basic notes.





Year 5 have been creating models of the Solar System using clay. We talked about scaled sizes, as well as looking carefully at what the planets look like and what they are made out of. We have also been looking at the book 'Noah and the Space Ark' focusing on the environment, pollution and global warming and writing our own formal letters of support for these. In Maths, we have continued working on fractions including adding and subtracting fractions with different denominators.







Year 6 have had an amazing start to Term 4 and have been enjoying our science unit on microbes. We have been finding out all about the different types of microorganisms, how they can be both helpful and harmful, designing our own microbes and testing the best conditions for growing mould. During Literacy, we have been working on creating cohesion within our writing and how to write effective dialogues. In Maths, we have been focusing on ratio, units of measure and shape and solving problems involving these.

Year 6 have also been involved in mentoring sessions and have been enjoying time with their mentees.

Charlotte and Yusef told the DBA News how much they enjoyed their mentoring sessions because they get to play outside with their mentor which gives them a break from the class. When they return to class, they feel much better!

A selection of pupils in Year 6 have recently had the opportunity to go and visit Norbar Torque Tools. They were lucky enough to explore the factory on a special tour where they saw the tools being made. They took part in a workshop where they saw the CAD software they use to make the initial designs for the tools. They then completed a science experiment looking at precision and accuracy and finally had a workshop on electrical components and circuits.

Pola told the DBA News that they learned all about the different careers at Norbar ranging from marketing to quality assurance, engineering to human resources. 'We saw all of the tools that they make using huge robotic arms!'

David (Year 6) told us how he enjoyed seeing the Torque Wrenches being made and how the huge ones were used on trucks.






Dashwood's World Book Day

























Cross-Academy Pupil Voice - Agents for Change

On 29th February 2024, our Year 5 and 6 Aspiration Council representatives and Head Pupils visited Futures' Institute for a collaborative Aspirations Networking and Training Day.

We started the training day by sharing our presentation on Dashwood News. We discussed the reasons for introducing DBA News and why it is important to us. We then listened to the other schools presentations on the projects they have been working on this past year.

In the next session, we had the opportunity to work collaboratively in mixed groups consisting of primary and secondary students. We discussed key conditions for learning including fun and excitement, curiosity and creativity and spirit of adventure, and what this looks like in our schools.

The final session of the day saw us return to our school groups to analyse the latest data from the Pupil Voice Survey. We discussed the outcomes of the survey, looking closely at each year group, and discussed key areas we would like to work on as a school.

Aspirations Council Training and Networking Day



Pupil Leadership Training - Sports Leaders, Junior Leaders and Aspiration Council

Some of our pupil leadership groups received some Aspirations Academy Trust training for their roles.

The Aspiration Council met to follow up on the previous day's Aspirations Networking and were joined by our younger councillors from KS1 and Lower KS2. They discussed the outcomes of the Pupil Voice Survey, analysed the data and suggested reasons behind the scores for each year group. They then voted on the two statements they wished to work on as a school.

Dashwood's Recipe Corner

Chocolate Easter Egg Nest Cakes

Makes 12 nests
Preparation time - less than
30 mins + less than 10
minutes cooking time

Ingredients:

225g/8oz dark chocolate, broken into pieces

2 tbsp. golden syrup

50g/2oz butter

 $75g/2\frac{3}{4}$ oz cornflakes



What You Need to Do: Make sure you have an adult to help you!

Line a 12-hole fairy cake tin with paper cases.

Melt the chocolate, golden syrup and butter in a bowl set over a saucepan of gently simmering water (do not let the base of the bowl touch the water). Stir the mixture until smooth.

Remove the bowl from the heat and gently stir in the cornflakes until all of the cereal is coated in the chocolate.

Divide the mixture between the paper cases and press 3 chocolate eggs into the centre of each nest.

Chill in the fridge for 1 hour, or until completely set.

Makes 15 to 20 pieces
Preparation time 30 mins - 1
hour + less than 10 minutes
cooking time

Ingredients:

- 175g/6oz dark chocolate, broken into pieces
- 125g/4½oz milk chocolate, broken into pieces
- 2 tbsp. golden syrup
- 75g/2³/₄oz unsalted butter, diced
- 160g/5¾oz sugar-coated mini chocolate eggs
- 200g/7oz digestives or rich tea biscuits, broken into pieces
- 75g/2¾oz mini marshmallows
- 50g/1¾oz hazelnuts, roughly chopped
- 75g/2³oz raisins

What You Need to Do: Make sure you have an adult to help you!

Line a 20x30cm/8x12in baking tin with baking paper.

Place the dark and milk chocolate pieces in a large heatproof bowl and add the golden syrup and butter. Set the bowl over a pan of barely simmering water but do not allow the bottom of the bowl to touch the water. Stir from time to time until the butter and chocolate are melted and the mixture is smooth. Remove from the heat and leave to cool for 5 minutes - if this is too hot the marshmallows will melt.


Cut the chocolate mini eggs in half (leaving a few whole) and set aside one third of the eggs, including the whole ones for decorating. Gently fold in the chocolate eggs, biscuits, marshmallows, nuts and raisins into the chocolate mixture and mix to combine. Spoon into the prepared tin and spread level using the back of the spoon. Scatter with the reserved whole and halved mini eggs.

Refrigerating for at least 1 hour, or until completely firm.


Cut into bars to serve.





Free or cheap things to do over the Easter break

Make your own 'Play-Doh' salt dough to save on the branded cost

Branded Play-Doh usually costs about £4 for a pack of four 112g tubs, but you can easily save money by making your own playdough. You only need four common household ingredients (vegetable oil, plain flour, table salt and food colouring, plus warm water), which should cost about £3 total, and you'll be able to make more than four small tubs, so you'll save money in the long run. You can use an online recipe, such as BBC Good Food's playdough recipe.









Remember to store it in plastic wrap or an airtight container if you want to reuse your dough, but dough-n't eat it!

TOP TIPS: Use less food colouring to make a lighter shade, for example, make pink playdough with a small drop of red food colouring. It's probably best to make lighter colours anyway, as the salt dough can stain clothes and other soft furnishings.
